BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

OBJECTIVE

A. DEFINITION OF MUTUAL AID:

Mutual Aid is organized, supervised, coordinated, cooperative, reciprocal assistance in which personnel, equipment and physical facilities of all participating fire departments, regardless of type or size, are utilized for fire or other emergencies in which the services of firefighters would be used throughout the County of Broome and adjacent areas.

B. AMENDMENTS:

Amendments to this plan may be periodically made and will follow this procedure:

1. Prepared by the Broome County Fire Coordinator.
2. Reviewed for comments and adopted by the Broome County Fire Chief's, Inc., Board of Directors.
3. Adopted by the Broome County Fire Chief's, Inc.
4. Submitted to the Broome County Fireman's Association.
5. Submitted to the Broome County Fire Advisory Board.
6. Submitted by the Fire Coordinator to the Broome County Legislature for adoption.
7. Admitted into the State Fire Mobilization and Mutual Aid Plan.

C. ANNUAL REVIEW:

Each year, this plan shall be reviewed by the Fire Coordinator and the Broome County Fire Chief's, Inc., and corrections or changes processed.

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

PARTICIPATION

A. EXTENT AND LIMIT OF PARTICIPATION BY FIRE DEPARTMENTS:

All cities, towns, villages, fire districts and industrial fire brigades in Broome County may participate in this plan. State and Federal Institutions may participate in this plan as State and Federal Laws allow (Appendix A).

B. EXTENT AND LIMIT OF PARTICIPATION WITH THE COUNTIES OF DELAWARE, CHENANGO, CORTLAND and TIOGA COUNTY NEW YORK

Mutual Aid is provided to and received from these counties through their respective County Fire Control Centers under the direction of their County Fire Coordinators or legally appointed deputies.

C. EXTENT and LIMIT of PARTICIPATION with ADJACENT COUNTIES in PENNSYLVANIA:

There is no formal agreement with the State of Pennsylvania. Local reciprocal assistance, if any, is in accordance with Section 209 of the General Municipal Law. All requests for assistance will be routed through the Broome County 911 Center.

Those departments willing to provide services to fire departments across state lines may do so after assuring proper insurance coverage for personnel and equipment and indicating their availability to respond, in writing, to the Fire Coordinator.

D. ENTERING AND PARTICIPATING IN THE PLAN:

Any duly established fire department, fire company or fire brigade may participate in this plan by filing a copy of a resolution adopted by the fire department, fire company or fire brigade in the Office of the County Fire Coordinator. Such resolution shall state that such fire department, fire company or fire brigade elects to participate in the Broome County Fire Mutual Aid Plan and will comply with provisions of such plan. The resolution shall state that the fire department, Fire Company or fire brigade recognize a call for assistance from another fire department, fire company or fire brigade through the Broome County Communications Center. A fire department, fire company or fire brigade participating in this plan further accepts an obligation to respond to a call for assistance unless conditions preclude it and further agrees that only those resources requested or planned for previously are to be sent unless conditions preclude it. (Appendix B).

There shall also be filed with the County Fire Coordinator a copy of a resolution adopted by

the legislative body of each participating city, village, the Board of Fire Commissioners of each fire district participating, or the town board of each town in relation to the participating fire company or fire department serving territories outside of cities, villages and fire districts, or in relation to a town fire department; such resolution shall state that no resolution exists against "Outside Service" by the fire department or fire company of the municipality or district within the meaning of Section 209 of the General Municipal Law which would affect the power of such fire departments or fire companies to participate in the Broome County Fire Mutual Aid Plan.

If the Outside Service activities of participating fire company or fire department are restricted pursuant to Section 209 of the General Municipal Law, notice of any restriction shall be given promptly to the Fire Coordinator. Any such restriction imposed by the legislative body of a city, village, or town or by the Board of Fire Commissioners of a fire district shall take effect in accordance with the resolution imposing the restrictions.

E. WITHDRAWAL FROM THE PLAN:

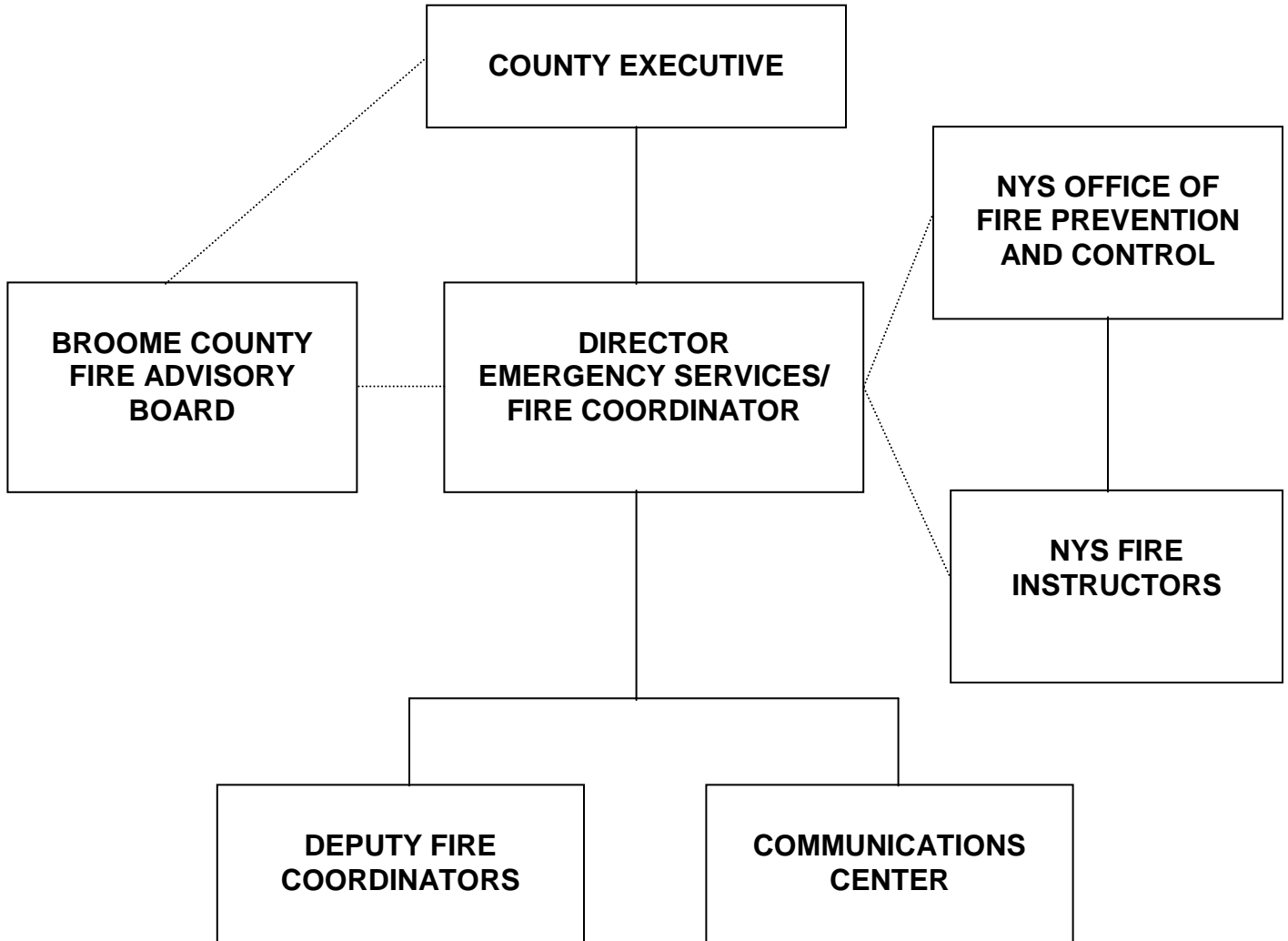
Any fire department, fire company or fire brigade may elect to withdraw from this plan by adopting a resolution to such an effect. Such withdrawal shall become effective thirty (30) days after filing such notice with the County Fire Coordinator.

Withdrawal from this plan will result in the suspension of Mutual Aid pursuant to this plan to the fire department, fire company or fire brigade taking such action. Such withdrawal shall remain in effect until reinstated by resolution as defined by Section 209 of the General Municipal Law. On the effective date of withdrawal, the fire department, fire company or fire brigade shall surrender and return to Broome County all County-owned equipment.

EXTENT AND LIMIT OF AUTHORITY OF FIRE COORDINATOR AND DEPUTIES

A. COUNTY FIRE COORDINATOR:

As Chief Fire Officer at the County level for the fire service:

1. Administers the State Fire Training Program and any and all training programs developed by the state or by his office throughout the county.
2. Selects and establishes locations for courses, determines the need for existing courses and new courses.
3. Maintains records indicating manpower in the county including the type and extent of training in each department.
4. Administers the County Mutual Aid Plan and is responsible for the efficient operation of the plan for intra and inter county purposes at fires or where the service of firefighters are used.
5. Administers the Broome County Communications Center Fire Services Policy, maintains the inventory of manpower and equipment.
6. Acts as liaison officer between the fire service of Broome County and the New York State Office of Fire Prevention and Control, the County Legislature and the County Fire Advisory Board.
7. May appoint and remove Deputy Fire Coordinators in accordance with state laws.
8. Plans and estimates the need for additional or unique equipment for the county and recommends the purchase of such equipment.
9. Acts as aide to fire chiefs in cases of mutual aid alarms of fires or other incidents requiring the services of firefighters and orders the Communications Center to dispatch aid at the request of the fire chief.
10. Oversees the functioning of the New York State Fire Reporting System and Burn Incident Reporting conducted by the State Office of Fire Prevention and Control.
11. Issues statements to newspapers, radio, television, press wire services and news outlets.
12. Arranges for speaking engagements and programs to present the fire services in the best light.
13. Administers the County Arson Control Plan (Appendix C).
14. Administers the County Hazardous Material Response Plan (Appendix D).
15. Is notified whenever an incident requires mutual aid and may automatically respond at his discretion.

B. DEPUTY FIRE COORDINATOR:

Directly responsible to the County Fire Coordinator:

1. Performs the duties or functions of the County Fire Coordinator when so directed or authorized by the County Fire Coordinator.
2. Shall possess the powers of, and perform the duties and functions of, the Fire Coordinator during the absence of the Fire Coordinator or during his inability to act, in accordance with the provisions of the chain of command elsewhere set forth in this plan, and pursuant to Section 401 of the General Municipal Law.

C. COUNTY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER DISPATCHER(S):

Directly responsible to the Emergency Services Communications Supervisor:

1. Dispatchers will be responsible for the operations of the County Communications Center and for maintaining efficient dispatching procedures to insure that apparatus and fire personnel will be promptly dispatched to fire and emergencies. Responsible for maintaining complete and accurate County Communications Center records and all other duties assigned by the Emergency Services Communications Supervisor or his designee. Dispatchers shall test emergency equipment at the County Communications Center and in finding said equipment inoperative will notify the proper authorities and the County Fire Coordinator.

LINE OF AUTHORITY

A. ABSENCE OF THE COUNTY FIRE COORDINATOR:

The County Fire Coordinator shall designate in writing and file in the Office of the County Clerk, in the Office of the Clerk of the County Legislature and the County Fire Advisory Board the order in which Deputy Fire Coordinators are to possess the powers and perform the duties of the County Fire Coordinator during his absence or inability to act, pursuant to Section 401 of the County Law (Appendix E).

B. VACANCY IN POSITION OF COUNTY FIRE COORDINATOR:

The County Fire Coordinator shall designate the Deputy County Fire Coordinator who shall possess the powers and perform the duties of the County Fire Coordinator until a successor is appointed by the Broome County Executive as recommended by the Broome County Fire Advisory Board.

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

STATUS OF THE LOCAL FIRE DEPARTMENT

A. MAINTENANCE OF INDIVIDUALITY:

Each fire department or fire company participating in this plan shall retain its internal command and individuality.

B. AUTHORITY OF "REQUESTING" FIRE CHIEF OR OFFICER IN CHARGE:

1. A requesting fire chief or officer in charge is one who requests mutual aid for his department or specific equipment in accordance with this plan.
2. The "Line of Command" at a fire or other emergency in which mutual aid is requested remains with the requesting department.
3. The fire officer in command of the fire or emergency will work with chiefs, senior officers and company officers of departments providing mutual aid. The firefighters in the assisting departments will be supervised by their own officers who are, in turn, commanded by the officers of the department requesting mutual aid.

OPERATION OF THE COUNTY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

A. LOCATION:

B. SUPERVISION AND DISPATCHING SERVICES:

1. The County Fire Coordinator is responsible for all fire activities of the County Communications Center and is authorized to dispatch.
2. Additional Dispatching Service. The County Fire Coordinator and all Deputy County Fire Coordinators are authorized to dispatch.

C. RADIO AND TELEPHONE REGULATION COMMUNICATIONS:

1. The radio and telephone procedure shall conform in every respect with that prescribed by the Federal Communications Commission, and the County Fire Coordinator.
2. Each participating fire department, fire company or fire brigade will provide their own radio and telephone equipment to contact the Broome County Communications Center, and shall conform to the Federal Communications Commission regulations, with respect to licensing and operation of base stations on the fire network, subject to the approval of the County Fire Coordinator.
3. No radio may operate on the fire frequencies as part of the fire network unless specifically authorized by the County Fire Coordinator and must operate in accordance with the regulations of the Federal Communications Commission.
4. Identifiers for all vehicles will be designated by the County Fire Coordinator. A list of equipment identified by the County Fire Coordinator will be furnished each department or fire company (Appendix F).
5. Emergency alternate control centers will be designated by the County Fire Coordinator, Deputy Fire Coordinators, or the dispatcher on duty at the County Communications Center. An alternate control center would take over in time of emergency, which would depend on the location of the emergency. The following will automatically take over should the County Communications Center be out of service.
 - a) Twist Run Road Transmitter Site
 - b) Hawkins Hill Transmitter Site
 - c) Fire Coordinator's Vehicle
 - d) Broome County Emergency Communications Van
 - e) Ingraham Hill Transmitter Tower
 - f) Edwin A Link Airport CFR

D. COMMUNICATIONS WITH ADJOINING COUNTY FIRE CONTROL CTRS:

1. There is direct radio contact with the following adjoining counties on 45.88 MHz:
 - a) Delaware County
 - b) Chenango County
 - c) Cortland County
 - d) Tioga County
2. There is direct radio contact with the Susquehanna County, Pennsylvania, Fire Control Center on 33.86 MHz.
3. Telephone and radio communications with the County Fire Coordinator and County Fire Control Centers of these adjoining counties shall be listed at the County Communications Center.

METHOD OF DETERMINING STATUS OF EQUIPMENT, APPARATUS AND MANPOWER:

1. The County Fire Coordinator shall maintain a Status Board for rapidly determining the status of equipment, apparatus and manpower at the County Communications Center.
2. Radio Log and Repair Record Sheets:
2. The County Fire Coordinator shall have prepared a suitable radio log meeting the minimum standards of the Federal Communications Commission and the New York State Office of Fire Prevention and Control.
3. The radio system shall be operated and maintained in a manner to provide the most efficient coverage of the entire County.

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

INVENTORY

A. LOCATION OF COUNTY INVENTORY:

1. The County Inventory Records shall be located as follows:
 - a) County Communications Center.
 - b) Fire Coordinator's Office.
 - c) Fire Coordinator's Vehicle.
 - d) Deputy Fire Coordinators' Vehicles.
2. The County Fire Coordinator is responsible for maintaining the county inventory.
3. Each fire chief shall immediately notify the County Fire Coordinator of any change in his department inventory.
4. It is the responsibility of each fire department, fire company or fire brigade to continuously maintain, furnish the County Fire Coordinator with the original fire defense card completely filled out and advise the County Fire Coordinator of personnel that have been removed from the rolls.
5. It is the duty of the Fire Chief to notify the County Communications Center, complete with telephone numbers of both business and residence, address, and place of employment of officers and key personnel.
6. Yearly an updated department inventory will be forwarded to the Fire Coordinator's Office. Such inventory will be submitted on forms supplied by the Office of Fire Prevention and Control. Annually department inventories will be submitted by the Fire Coordinator to the New York State Office of Fire Prevention and Control (Appendix G).

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

COORDINATION WITH OTHER EMERGENCY SERVICES

Informal agreements exist with other services and close liaison is maintained with police, emergency management, amateur radio and commercial radio. A file of telephone numbers of these services is maintained.

STANDARD THREAD

All apparatus and its associated equipment participating in this plan should be equipped with National Standard threads as defined by the National Bureau of Standards, or provide sufficient adapters to permit inter-connection with NST. Consideration should be given to obtaining Quick-Connecting Adapters for large diameter hose.

TRAINING

The State Training Program shall be adopted as standard for the County of Broome through the Broome County Fire Coordinator.

COUNTY WIDE REPORTING

A. COUNTY WIDE FIRE REPORTING:

1. Under the guidelines of General Municipal Law Section 204-D, the Fire Chief shall file with the Office of Fire Prevention and Control a Field Incident Report for every incident. These reports shall be submitted to the above named office on a monthly basis. The Fire Coordinator shall encourage each chief or designated officer to file a copy of the New York State Field Incident Report and other appropriate Reports on a monthly basis with the Office of Fire Prevention & Control.

B. COUNTY WIDE HAZARDOUS MATERIAL REPORTING:

1. Under the guidelines of General Municipal Law Section 209-U, the Fire Chief or designated officer shall file with the Office of the Fire Coordinator a copy of the Hazardous Material Substance Report submitted by the local facilities who store hazardous materials on their premises.

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

PARTICIPATION IN THE STATE MOBILIZATION AND MUTUAL AID PLAN

A. PROCEDURE TO OBTAIN ACTIVATION OF THE PLAN:

1. County Fire Coordinator or a Deputy in the line of authority designated pursuant to Section 401 of the County Law, after utilizing all available assistance from Chenango, Cortland, Tioga and Delaware Counties, may call the Office of Fire Prevention and Control of the State of New York to obtain activation of the State Fire Mobilization and Mutual Aid Plan.
2. The procedure shall conform with that specified in the GUIDE TO FIRE MOBILIZATION AND MUTUAL AID PLANS IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK by the New York State Office of Fire Prevention and Control.

B. AUTHORITY AND RESPONSIBILITY OF THE REGIONAL FIRE ADMINISTRATOR:

1. The authority and responsibility of the Regional Fire Administrator under the activated State Fire Mobilization and Mutual Aid Plan is established by the Office of Fire Prevention and Control of New York State.

C. RETIREMENT PROVISION RELATING TO THE POSITION OF REGIONAL FIRE ADMINISTRATOR:

1. Should the County Fire Coordinator be separated from his office for any reason, he is automatically retired as Administrator if he also holds the position of Regional Fire Administrator. The Fire Administrator of the Office of Fire Prevention and Control of New York State is authorized by law to appoint to this position.

D. BROOME COUNTY EMERGENCY DISASTER OPERATIONS PLAN:

1. This plan as approved shall become part of and be noted as the Fire Service Annex within the Broome County Emergency Disaster Operation Plan.

E. INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

1. The complexity of incident management ,coupled with the growing need for multi-agency and multi-functional involvement on incidents, has increased the need for a single standard incident management system that can be utilized by all emergency response agencies **and that is recognized by the National Incident Management System (NIMS)**

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

ICS provides an important framework from which all agencies can work together. In any incident many agencies may become involved. The challenge is to get the various agencies to work together in the most efficient and effective manner

On March 5th,1996, Governor Pataki signed Executive Order #26 establishing the National Interagency Incident Management-Incident Command System as the State standard incident management system that will be utilized during emergency operations.

All County Fire Personnel are required under Federal Regulations to be trained in the following courses IC-700 Introduction to NIMS and IC-100 Introduction to ICS in addition all Chief Officers are to be trained in IC-200 Basic ICS and all personnel required to participate in an Emergency Operations Center Environment must be trained in IC-300 and IC-400.

APPENDIX C

BROOME COUNTY ARSON CONTROL PLAN

(as amended 1986)

Be it resolved that all fire occurring in Broome County shall be properly investigated as to the cause and origin by the Fire Chief or his designee having jurisdiction where the said fire has occurred in accordance with the duties of a Fire Chief as described in General Municipal Law 204-D of 1979 and reads as follows:

Duties of the Fire Chief

"The Fire Chief of any Fire Department or Company shall, in addition to any other duties assigned to him by law or contract, to the extent reasonably possible determine or cause to be determined the cause of each fire or explosion which the Fire Department or Company has been called to suppress. He shall contact or cause to be contacted the appropriate investigatory authority if he has reason to believe the fire or explosion is of incendiary or suspicious origin."

When the Fire Chief or his designee in whose jurisdiction a said fire or explosion or threat of fire peril has occurred and has been unable to determine the cause of said incident or has determined the cause to be of incendiary or suspicious origin, shall pursuant to Sec. 204-D General Municipal Law request assistance from the appropriate investigatory authority. This authority shall be the Broome County Office of Emergency Services. Other such resources as may be required from the Broome County Fire Coordinator's Office shall be supplied pursuant to the Broome County Fire Mutual Aid Plan.

The Broome County Fire Coordinator's Office shall upon receipt of a request from any Fire Department or Company having jurisdiction within Broome County for assistance in determining the cause and origin of any fire or explosion shall assign a qualified Fire Investigator to assist the said Fire Department in conducting an investigation as to the cause and circumstances surrounding said fire or explosion. The Broome County Office of Emergency Services, Bureau of Fire Investigation, may also be assigned to assist any law enforcement agency or the Broome County District Attorney's Office when so requested. The Bureau of Fire Investigation shall also investigate all fires occurring on property owned, leased, or under the control of the County of Broome. If the Fire Department having jurisdiction where said fire investigation is taking place is not aware of the ongoing investigation it shall be notified of the investigation as soon as possible in all cases except where confidentiality is critical to the investigation.

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

If in the opinion of the Fire Investigator assigned, the cause of the fire appears to be of an incendiary nature and/or a crime may have been committed an Arson Task Force may be created to further the investigation. Such Arson Task Force shall be designed to meet the needs of each and every individual arson incident. Under the guidance and counsel of the Broome County District Attorney's Office the following agencies and individuals may be included or excluded in the Arson Task Force as the particular case warrants:

1. Bureau of Fire Investigations - Broome County
2. Broome County District Attorney's Office
3. New York State Police
4. New York State Police Laboratory
5. Broome County Sheriff's Office
6. Jurisdictional Fire Chief
7. Jurisdictional Law Enforcement Agency
8. Insurance Company Representative
9. Other State and Federal Law Enforcement Agencies

The above list of Arson Task Force members shall in no way be considered to be complete or restrictive.

The Broome County District Attorney's Office shall be notified of the circumstances of the case as soon as possible. The District Attorney's Office shall be responsible for the prosecution of all matters arising under the laws of fire, explosions, extinguishment thereof, and fire perils. The District Attorney's Office may periodically create policy, set standards, make recommendations for conducting investigations of fires and explosions.

By authority of the Broome County Attorney all Fire Investigators assigned to the Broome County Bureau of Fire Investigation shall be designated as Peace Officers under the Criminal Procedure Law of the State of New York. All fire Investigators conduct, policies and procedures shall comply with the Fire Investigation Policy and Procedures Manual. Adequate records shall be maintained of all fire investigated and circumstances surrounding the investigation. Whenever possible a copy of the Fire Investigation Report shall be forwarded to the Fire Chief in whose jurisdiction the said fire occurred as soon as possible. If because of confidentiality the report cannot be released, a special Supplementary Report shall be prepared for the Fire Chief concerning the details of the investigation that may be released.

Primary responsibility for Fire Cause and Origin Determination will be that of the local Fire Departments in Broome County. Each Fire Department or Company shall be encouraged to participate in Fire/Arson Awareness training programs as offered by the New York State Office of Fire Prevention and Control, Broome County Fire Coordinators' Office and any other related training programs or resources that may be available.

NYS GENERAL MUNICIPAL LAW 204 – f

Purpose: The purpose of this plan is to meet the statutory requirements of New York State General Municipal Law section 204 – f titled “Plan for Hazardous Materials Incidents Response”. In addition it will provide guidance to the Local Emergency Planning Committee, legislative bodies, and most importantly for those who will be responsible to respond, save lives, as well as to stabilize and mitigate the results of a hazardous materials incident or threat of a release.

Intent: It is the purpose of this plan to provide guidance, identify and clarify certain responsibilities and expectations for incidents involving hazardous materials. The plan is for guidance and in some instances may require flexibility in how it is utilized given the immediate situation and resources available. This plan does not construe a legal contract for services and is designed to provide information required to gain the approval of the plan by New York State. Other plans such as the Local Emergency Planning Committee plan, the County Emergency Operations Plan, as well as the plans for local jurisdictions shall also be considered during any operational phase of an incident.

Guidance: Several portions of OSHA 29 CFR 1910.120 Hazardous Waste Sites and Emergency Response paragraph (q) which deals with emergency response have been included. This has been included for guidance. It is clearly understood that training, education, and certification of any employee who may respond to a hazardous materials incident within the framework of this plan is truly the sole responsibility of the responders employer.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INCIDENTS IN BROOME COUNTY

The County Fire Coordinator shall encourage each Chief or designated officer of a fire department participating in this plan to immediately notify the Broome County Communications Center in the event of a Hazardous Materials Incident. The County Communications Center shall maintain an extensive reference library on hazardous materials information and will maintain a complete listing of all agencies which should be notified in the event of an incident.

In the event of a Hazardous Materials Incident notification, the following will be notified by the Communications Center:

Director of Emergency Services/Fire Coordinator and/or designee

Hazardous Materials Response Team Officer

NYS Office of Fire Prevention and Control

NYS State Warning Point

If requested, the Fire Coordinator will respond and act as a resource person for the Fire Chief.

BROOME COUNTY FIRE SERVICE HAZARDOUS MATERIALS RESPONSE PLAN

This plan has as its primary concern the safety of the public and emergency personnel during incidents involving hazardous materials.

The authority for this plan rests in New York State General Municipal Law 204-F and reads as follows:

Plan for Hazardous Materials Response

"In accordance with rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to subdivision eight of section two hundred nine-c of this chapter, the governing body of a county, except a county wholly contained within a city, and the governing body of a city in which a county is wholly contained shall develop a plan for fire service response to hazardous material incidents. Such plan shall be submitted to the Office of Fire Prevention and Control for approval. No plan shall be approved unless it provides for the coordination of fire service resources consistent with guidelines established by the office."

It will be further understood that as this plan is accepted by the following organizations that this plan will become a part of the Broome County Fire Mutual Aid Plan:

Broome County Fire Coordinator's Office
Broome County Fire Chief's Association
Broome County Firemen's Association
Broome County Fire Advisory Board
Broome County Executive
Broome County Legislature

This plan is further developed to be in line with the recommendations as brought forth in the New York State Fire Safety Advisory Board Position Paper of August 7, 1985, regarding Hazardous Material Response in New York State.

Lastly, due to the planning requirements established under the Federal Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act (SARA) and local community planning, this plan is designed to compliment the Response Plan of the Local Emergency Planning Committee.

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

DEFINITIONS

Hazardous Materials - All materials listed in the Hazardous Materials Code of Federal Regulations Title 49 Section 172.101 as well as any substance or materials in a quantity or form that may pose an unreasonable risk to life, health, property or the environment if released.

Hazardous Materials Incident - Any release of a hazardous material which threatens the safety of citizens, property or the environments.

SCOPE

The public looks to the fire service for assistance and leadership in the safety field, the ever increasing use, storage and transportation of hazardous chemicals has become a way of life. It is inevitable that when an incident occurs, the fire service will be one of the first emergency agencies to respond and be expected to handle the incident. Therefore, in Broome County, the fire service should be considered the lead agency in the mitigation of all incidents involving the release or possible release of any hazardous materials.

LEVELS OF RESPONSE

The Broome County Hazardous Materials Plan provides for three levels of hazardous material incident classification and response. This classification will be initiated by the first arriving senior fire officer and may be upgraded or downgraded as required. The classification system is as follows (Section A).

COMMAND AND MANAGEMENT

Overall command of a Hazardous Material Incident will rest with the local fire department, however, it is expected that as the size and complexity of an incident increases the number of personnel giving input to overall decision making will increase.

As mandated by OSHA requirements the Command Post Incident Command System will be utilized at all Hazardous Materials Incidents.

Broadly stated, when all interests have gathered, duties will be as follows:

EMS - attending to the health concerns of the injured or exposed

FIRE - dealing with any potential or actual fires or chemical releases

POLICE - managing and controlling access to the scene, dealing with traffic and people and, as well, any matter considered a breach of the peace. In particular, police must deal with the nature of any form of accident causing injury or death to individuals.

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

I. Incident Organization

At a hazardous material related incident or the threat of release the senior fire official of the authority having jurisdiction shall become the incident commander for the emergency phase of the incident.

When the incident has been stabilized should it be deemed appropriate the command of the incident may be transferred to another appropriate official or individual such as the property owner or manager, clean-up contractor, or other local or state government official with a responsibility for the incident.

When an incident requires the resources of several agencies and their resources to stabilize the incident a unified command structure is recommended. Ultimately there will be one incident commander to oversee the incident action plan and to ensure the safety of responders.

Incident scene operations and emergency response personnel should, as a minimum, be trained and operate in accordance with 29 CFR 1910.129 OSHA for Hazardous Waste Sites and Emergency Response. Paragraph (q)(3) identifies procedures for handling the emergency response as follows:

- (i) The senior emergency response official shall become the individual in charge of a site-specific Incident Command System (ICS). All emergency responders and communications shall be coordinated and controlled through the individual in charge of the ICS assisted by the senior official present for each employer.

Note: The “senior official” at an emergency response is the most senior official on the site who has the responsibility for controlling the operations at the site. Initially it is the senior official on the first-due piece of responding apparatus to arrive on the incident scene. As more senior officers arrive (i.e. battalion chief, fire chief, state law enforcement officer, site coordinator, etc.) the position is passed up the line of authority which has been previously established.

- (ii) The individual in charge of the ICS shall identify, to the extent possible, all hazardous substances or conditions present and shall address appropriate site analysis, use of engineering controls, maximum exposure limits, hazardous substance handling procedures, and use any new technologies.
- (iii) Based on the hazardous substances and/or conditions present, the individual in charge of the ICS shall implement appropriate emergency operations, and assure that the personnel protection worn is appropriate for the hazards to be encountered. However, personnel protective equipment shall meet, at a minimum, the criteria contained in 29 CFR 1910.156 (e) (Fire Brigade) when worn while performing fire

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

fighting operations beyond the incipient state for any incident or site.

- (iv) Employees engaged in emergency response to hazardous substances presenting an inhalation hazard or potential inhalation hazard shall wear positive pressure self-contained breathing apparatus while engaged in the emergency response, until such time the individual in charge of the ICS determines, through the use of air monitoring, that a decreased level of respiratory protection will not result in hazardous exposures to employees.
- (v) The individual in charge of the ICS shall limit the number of emergency response personnel at the emergency site, in those areas of potential or actual exposure, to those who are actively performing emergency operations. However, operations in hazardous areas shall be performed using the buddy system in groups of two or more.
- (vi) Back-up personnel shall stand-by with equipment ready to provide assistance or rescue. Advanced first aid support personnel, as a minimum, shall also stand-by with medical equipment and transportation capability.
- (vii) The individual in charge of the ICS shall designate a safety official, who is knowledgeable in the operations being implemented at the emergency response site, with a specific responsibility to identify and evaluate hazards and to provide direction with respect to the safety of the operations for the emergency at hand.
- (viii) When activities are judged by the safety official to be an IDLH (Immediately Dangerous to Life and Health) condition and/or to involve an imminent danger condition, the safety official shall have the authority to alter, suspend, or terminate those activities. The safety official shall immediately inform the individual in charge of the ICS of any actions needed to be taken to correct these hazards at an emergency scene.
- (ix) After emergency conditions have been terminated, the individual in charge of the ICS shall implement appropriate decontamination procedures.

II. Organizations that have a primary, lead, or support role in a hazardous materials incident or potential for a release shall be identified and their roles described:

Note: These individuals would be expected to be certified by their employer as meeting the training and educational requirements for their appropriate level of response capability:

(q)(6) Training: Training shall be based on the duties and function performed by each responder of an emergency response organization. The skill and knowledge levels required for all new

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

responders, those hired after the effective date of this standard (March 6, 1989) shall be conveyed to them through training before they are permitted to take part in an actual emergency operations at an incident. Employees who participate or are expected to participate, in an emergency response, shall be given training in accordance with the following paragraphs:

- (i) First responder Awareness Level: First responders at the awareness level are individuals who are likely to witness or discover a hazardous substance release and who have been trained to initiate an emergency response sequence by notifying the proper authorities of the release. They would take no further action at the awareness level beyond notifying the authorities of the release.
 - (ii) First responder Operations Level: First responders at the operations level are individuals who respond to releases or potential releases of hazardous substances as part of an initial response to the site for the purpose of protecting nearby persons, property, or the environment from the effects of the release. Their function is to contain the release from a safe distance, keep it from spreading, and prevent exposures. First responders at the operations level shall have received at least eight hours of training or have had sufficient experience to objectively demonstrate competency.
 - (iii) Hazardous Materials Technician: Hazardous materials technicians are individuals who respond to releases or potential releases for the purpose of stopping the release. They assume a more aggressive role than a first responder at the operations level in that they will approach the point of release in order to plug, patch, or otherwise stop the release of a hazardous substance. Hazardous materials technicians shall have received at least 24 hours of training equal to the first responder operations level and in addition have competency.
 - (iv) Hazardous Materials Specialist: Not specifically referenced in this plan.
 - (v) On Scene Incident Commander: Incident commanders, who assume control of the incident beyond the first responder awareness level, shall receive at least 24 hours of training equal to the first responder operations level and in addition have competency.
- (q)(8) Refresher training: Those employees who are trained in accordance with paragraph (q)(6) of this section shall receive annual refresher training of sufficient content and duration to maintain their competencies, or shall demonstrate competency in those areas at least yearly. A statement shall be made of the training and competency, and if a statement of competency is made, the employer shall keep a record of the methodology used to demonstrate competency.

A. First Responder Awareness Level:

The following organizations, agencies, or groups that may be expected to witness, discover, or support strategic goals in a safe areas outside the contamination zone are as follows:

1. All law enforcement personnel who may be engaged in the discovery or the response of a hazardous materials incident.
2. All emergency medical personnel
3. All emergency management personnel
4. All health and environmental officials
5. All public works (sanitation, water & sewer, road maintenance)

All law enforcement agencies that may respond to a hazardous material incident will perform their assigned duties within the scope of the incident action plan in support of the incident objectives.

All emergency medical response agencies that may respond to a hazardous materials incident will perform their assigned duties within the scope of the incident action plan in support of the incident objectives. Of particular concern is the issue of contamination. The response personnel should ensure that the patients have been adequately decontaminated prior to providing patient care. Any patient care provided before patient decontamination must be performed by responders appropriately trained and adequately protected.

All other support personnel that may respond to a hazardous materials incident will perform their assigned duties within the scope of the incident action plan in support of the incident objectives.

B. First Responder Operations Level

The following organizations, agencies, or groups that may be expected to respond to a hazardous materials incident and support strategic goals in a safe area outside the contamination zone are as follows:

1. All fire department active response personnel

C. Hazardous Materials Technicians:

The following organizations, agencies, or groups that may be expected to implement strategic goals working in specialized protective equipment inside the contamination zone are as follows:

1. Broome County Hazardous Materials team members
2. City of Binghamton Hazardous Materials team members
3. County Fire Coordinator and deputies involved in emergency response

D. Incident Commanders:

1. Fire officers
2. Firefighters who could be the incident commander due to the lack of an officer being present
3. County Fire Coordinator and deputies involved in emergency responses.

III. Organizational relationships and responsibilities:

- A. Hazardous materials incidents or threats of a release that can be managed and stabilized within the authority having jurisdiction shall utilize their normal operational procedures. Interagency agreements or procedures for incident support shall be appropriate for incident stabilization.
- B. Incidents requiring outside assistance shall utilize the Fire Mobilization and Mutual Aid plan for fire resources and fire department based hazardous materials resources, and county hazardous materials response unit. Other resources shall be requested via the established agreements and practices for such agencies.
- C. Incidents involving a potential threat for a Weapon of Mass Destruction shall utilize the appropriate hazardous materials response units as well as other resources to determine the level of threat and resources necessary. If appropriate the Director of Emergency Services/Fire Coordinator, or local fire chief can request additional county, state, and federal resources through the Office of Emergency Services.
- D. Should the incident have a potential for an off site release of vapor, liquid, or solid material and potentially impact other jurisdictions the incident commander shall notify or cause to be notified the appropriate jurisdictions. The incident commander

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

shall provide information about the product(s), the nature of the release or potential release, emergency actions being taken by the agency having jurisdiction, and estimated time that the product may arrive at the outside jurisdiction. Information such as vapor density, specific gravity, and other chemical information would be important considerations to forward to another jurisdiction as well as the strategy in place for the incident. Is there an effort to plug the leak, dike or contain the product, extinguish the fire, or controlled burn?

- E. All notifications shall be made by the appropriate dispatch or coordination office.

IV. Response procedures and points of contact

Note: Because this listing may have non-listed or private phone numbers referenced will be kept only at dispatch center, the office of the Director of Emergency Services, the Fire Coordinators' office and with the LEPC chairperson.

- A. Copy of this plan has been placed at the dispatch centers, contact numbers placed prominently displayed, and an easily read summary of appropriate actions that may require notification procedures to be implemented.

V. Communications plan

- A. Primary alerting shall be done through the normal paging systems.
- B. The emergency alert system will be utilized to warn or inform the citizens. If an evacuation is required or sheltering in place is advised the radio and television stations will be utilized.
- C. If an evacuation is needed during a time period when people may not be watching television or listening to a radio, a vehicle with public address systems will be utilized in addition to a house-to-house notification. The incident commander must determine early if any special protective equipment is required for the emergency workers that may be in a contamination zone or any special decontamination that should be utilized. Unprotected rescue workers must work only in safe areas.

VI. Evacuation and isolation plans

- A. The county has been divided into evacuation grid maps and municipalities as well, as response agencies, have been supplied with multiple copies so that they may be distributed to emergency workers performing a door to door evacuation.

BROOME COUNTY MUTUAL AID PLAN

- B. The Broome County EOP has a mass evacuation plan that for temporary and long term shelters. All sheltering and mass feeding is under the direction of the American Red Cross..
 - C. Handbills for sheltering in place procedures will be available and placed in all municipalities as well as response organizations. The brochure explains how to seal the building, shut down outside air intake sources, closing blinds, placing a bright colored cloth on the front door to let response personnel know there is someone in residence, and so on.
- VII. Facilities that manufacture, store, or use hazardous materials that pose unique response challenges in the event of a release or potential release are filed and listed in the Emergency Services Cameo System.
- VIII. Weapons of Mass Destruction
- A. In an effort to develop a level of preparedness for the potential of an intentional release of agents or materials considered as a Weapon of Mass Destruction special initiatives have been undertaken.
 - 1. All emergency response agencies have available Emergency Response to Terrorism: Awareness training.
 - 2. All fire departments have available Emergency Response to Terrorism: Basic Concepts (Operations Level) training.
 - 3. Both hazardous materials response teams have received Emergency Response to Terrorism: Tactical Considerations for Hazardous Materials Technicians training.
 - 4. All emergency medical service providers have available Emergency Response to Terrorism: Tactical Considerations for EMS training.
 - B. Specialized equipment has been provided to the two hazardous materials response teams to detect the presence of Biological, Chemical and Radiological agents or materials.
 - C. The Endicott Police Department Bomb Squad has been provided with explosive device detection equipment. The NY State Police Bomb Unit is their back-up.

- D. All fire departments have available training in decontamination and two specialized decontamination shower units have been assigned to the hazardous materials teams as well as the local hospitals..
 - E. The hospital emergency room staff has received training in handling contaminated patients and the need to limit contamination in the hospital.
 - F. Evidence sampling procedures have been developed in conjunction with the NYS DOH Laboratory.
 - G. A vulnerability and risk assessment has been conducted for Broome County. Evacuation and risk management plans have been developed for each facility that requires same. Due to the nature of the material the documents are law enforcement sensitive and not available under FOIL.
- IX. Updating and evaluation of plan.
- A. The plan will be reviewed by July 1st of each year by the County Director of Emergency Services/Fire Coordinator to ensure that all contact numbers are correct and current.
 - B. The plan will be reviewed annually (due to be completed by December 31st) by the Local Emergency Planning Committee, the County Fire Advisory Board..
 - C. The plan will be tested annually. One exercise will involve an accidental release of a chemical, flammable, or other product from a fixed facility or transportation incident. The second exercise will involve a Weapons of Mass Destruction agent or material.
